

### What can you find/do in Vrijbroekpark?

- Rose gardens (12.000 plants, 1500 taxa)
   Award of Garden excellence in 2003 by World federation of roses society
- Ecotope garden: different biotopes like sand dunes, moor, shadow plants, mediterranean herbs, ...
- Other gardens: summer garden with Dahlia and Canna, shadow garden with
  - Fuchsia, garden with bee plants
- Various plants and trees,
   about 800 species and varieties of trees
- New in 2019: Wilgernis with salicetum!





### What can you find/do in Vrijbroekpark?

- Outdoor sculptures and indoor exhibition area
- Sports: tennis, basketball, running track, hockey





- Fishing pond
- Traffic garden for children
- Playground
- Two restaurants

#### **De Ferraris**

1771 - 1778


The whole **Vrijbroekpark area** can be seen on **18th century** maps drawn by the Austrian General and Cartographer, **Joseph Jean Francois, count de Ferraris.** 

The area where the **Vrijbroekpark Salicetum** "**De Wilgernis**" has been organised had remained unchanged since that period.

  - → open for our visitors this year



  - Tree forms: pollard, coppice, weeping,...

- Scientific aspect
  - Not our main goal
  - Proper collection management
  - Correct labeling, review of specimens by specialists
  - Gather and maintain around 100 specimens

 March 2018: visiting the Botanische Gärten der Friedrich-Wilhelms-Universität, Bonn, Germany


May 2018: planting outside on a test field
